








How it was done

Van Blerk took hundreds of photographs in the city of Beirut and in the nearby countryside, from the seashore at Jounieh in the north to the hills of the Chouf seen from Jezzine, southeast of the capital.





From prints of these photographs he made seventeen collages on which he painted.

To present the event on the booth he used several BankMed buildings to create one large composition.

The sixteen other collages were used as scenary for the portraits.

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The BankMed booth became van Blerk's photography studio.

On the left hung sixteen collages. To the right was a long black curtain.

Van Blerk made two exposures which the camera combined in one picture.

The first exposure was of the portrait subject against the black curtain.

Immediately afterwards, a second exposure was made of the collage chosen by the sitter.



Vivian van Blerk signed the photograph digitally, downloaded it to a memory stick marked BankMed and gave it to the sitter.

The visitor's memory stick also contained a presentation of the Levantine Portrait Project and examples of Vivian van Blerk's photographic artworks.

More than 150 visitors to the booth posed.
